Though many holidays have cloudy origins, the history of **April Fools' Day** is particularly blurry, as there are several competing claims for the invention.

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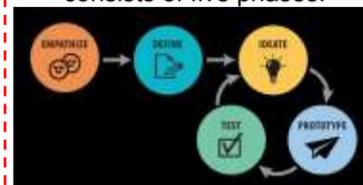

### A DESIGNER ADDRESSES CRITICISM OF DESIGN THINKING

Should you believe in something that's been over-hyped, over-promoted, and over-blown? In the case of design thinking, yes, you should. Like an overused cliché that still rings true, design thinking may be exaggerated as the cure-all for the uninspired, but it is too valuable a method to toss aside. Here, I will address some of the common criticisms of design thinking. In case you came late to the party, design thinking is both a mindset and a methodology for generating creative solutions. It's not magic, and it's not a silver bullet. Yet there are certain characteristics of design thinking that make it effective in almost any field, from business innovation to product design to learning design. Design thinking is iterative, human-centered and flexible. One of the original approaches to design thinking consists of five phases:



1. Empathize with the user
2. Define the problem
3. Ideate solutions
4. Prototype solutions
5. Test and refine the solutions

You will find the process described in varied phases and represented in different diagrams, but the general principles are the same. **Why design thinking is effective?**

### HOW APPLE'S EDUCATION DEVICES CHANGED THROUGH THE YEARS

If you grew up in an American school, there's a good chance you learned to type and do schoolwork on an Apple computer. That's not a coincidence. Apple has long been involved with schools to provide discounts and special packages to students and teachers alike. During the 1990s, the education market was lucrative enough to even justify the development of unique devices that were only sold in bulk to schools. Here, a tour of Apple's education devices throughout the years.

#### **Apple IIe**

Long before the Mac, there was the Apple II. Apple's first iconic computer became a mainstay in American classrooms in the 1980s. In fact, Apple donated thousands of Apple IIe desktops to California schools starting in 1983 as part of a program called Kids Can't Wait. Untold numbers of students got their first taste of BASIC programming, not to mention The Oregon Trail, on a classroom Apple II.
